INTRODUCTION

THE JERSEY YOUTH PARLIAMENT ORGANIZED THE 2ND 'LITTLE PARLIAMENT' EVENT AT CRABBE ON FEBRUARY 25TH, 2023. THE EVENT AIMED TO PROVIDE A PLATFORM FOR YEAR 6 STUDENTS TO DISCUSS ISSUES AFFECTING YOUNG PEOPLE AND SUGGEST CHANGES THEY WOULD LIKE TO SEE ON THE ISLAND. 29 STUDENTS FROM 15 DIFFERENT SCHOOLS ATTENDED THE EVENT.

Prior to the event, the students had discussions in their schools about various topics. They talked about issues affecting young people in Year 6, changes they would like to see in the island, and what they think adults making decisions should prioritise.

At the event, the young people fed back in groups about what they had discussed. There was a huge range of things shared. They expressed concerns about various issues, such as the need for more things to do and places to play, transport being an issue, concerns around education, the need for healthier food and more variety, care for the environment, stress from exams and homework, worries about going to secondary school, the cost of living being too high, the lack of affordable housing, and the problem of bullying in schools.

The young people also expressed their desire for adults to listen to them by doing events such as this and ensuring that the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) are upheld; "The government needs to respect our rights more such as the right to learn and play because they are building more flats but less entertainment for young people"

The 'Little Parliament' event provided a unique opportunity for Year 6 students to voice their concerns and suggestions for changes they would like to see on the island. The event was successful in promoting democratic values and educating the students about the importance of public speaking, critical thinking, and teamwork. The feedback provided by the young people will be used to inform the work of the Jersey Youth Parliament and other decisionmaking bodies in the island.

There were a number of key themes that kept cropping up and the young people fed back about these.

PLAY

The young people expressed a strong desire for more activities and places to go in Jersey. They talked about the need for free or affordable activities and events, and expressed disappointment over the potential closure of places like Fort Regent, Aquasplash, and the cinema. They highlighted the lack of entertainment options in the east of the island, and suggested that the government should build more entertainment venues around the island, not just in the west. Concerns were raised about the condition of certain parks, in particular the Elephant Park.

The students suggested having more variety in school meals instead of the same rotation. They also proposed the use of colour-coded labels on food packaging to indicate allergens in more schools. Additionally, they raised concerns about unhealthy food being brought into schools by students.



COST OF LIVING



costs of food and bills. They also expressed their views on the unfairness of the salary differences between footballers and essential workers such as nurses, police officers, and firefighters. They discussed the impact of the war in Ukraine and Russia on the cost of school essentials such as pencils, pencil cases, and rubbers. Additionally, some students expressed concerns about not having the necessary equipment for secondary school, such as a laptop, which could make them feel excluded and unable to fit in with their peers. The students also discussed the negative effects of bullying and social pressure on those who may not have enough money for certain things, and they advocated for equal opportunities regardless of one's financial situation.

TRANSPORT

Young people discussed various ideas on transport, including the need for more walking and bike paths around the island, as well as the issue of unsafe roads due to narrow pavements and construction work. They also suggested the need for more buses to activity centers so that they don't have to rely on parents so much. There were concerns raised about safety on buses, particularly regarding older teenagers intimidating younger children and damaging their belongings.

ONLINE SAFETY



The students discussed online safety and the limitations of school computers, which are programmed to block certain sites and pick up on certain keywords, which can be frustrating for students trying to research certain topics. They highlighted that while it's good to have protection, there are also downsides to the system, such as limiting their ability to learn about certain subjects and potentially getting wrongly flagged for inappropriate content.

ENVIRONMENT

The students are concerned about the lack of green areas for children to play and the prevalence of litter and pollution in public places. They suggest planting more trees and plants in public spaces such as around schools and by the cows in town, creating nature areas in playgrounds, and educating children more about climate change. They also suggest reducing the use of pesticides and enforcing laws against littering. Finally, they express concern about the pollution on beaches and in the sea, and the potential harm it can cause.

"WE ALL THINK CHILDREN SHOULD KNOW MORE ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE BECAUSE SOMETIMES SAY A TEACHER TELLS YOU ABOUT IT AND THEY'RE LIKE OH REALLY AND THEN SOMETIMES PEOPLE GET REALLY NERVOUS. I HAD THAT FEELING AND I WAS REALLY WORRIED BECAUSE I DIDN'T KNOW THAT THE WORLD WAS CHANGING AROUND ME LIKE THIS AND SO I THINK TEACHERS SHOULD HAVE MORE WORKSHOPS AND LESSONS ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE SO KIDS KNOW HOW TO HELP AND KNOW WHAT IT IS, AND UNDERSTAND MORE ABOUT IT"

EDUCATION

The students suggested that schools should have more options for subjects and multilingual teachers to support those who may struggle with English. They also proposed longer school breaks and days to allow for more play time and more interactive lessons. The students expressed concern about the high cost of living on the island hindering young people's ability to pursue their desired careers. They also advocated for embracing mistakes, providing more targeted instruction for struggling students and celebrating different nationalities and languages.

MOVING TO SECONDARY SCHOOL



The young people expressed concerns about the transition to secondary school, including potential loss of friends, navigating a larger school environment, and being separated from familiar teachers. They also mentioned worries about bus rides and the possibility of getting lost on the first day of school. They suggested that schools provide maps or other resources to help students navigate the new environment.

TESTS AND HOMEWORK



Year 6 students feel stressed about exams and tests, particularly because of the pressure to get good grades and the cramming of lessons by teachers. They identified that this stress can affect their mental and physical health. Additionally, students feel stressed about homework, as they may be given the same work as others despite being on different levels. They suggest that teachers provide more help with homework, and even homework clubs to provide support for those who struggle with the work.

SMOKING



They expressed concerns about smoking in public places, particularly around parks and green areas where children go to play. They also mentioned feeling uncomfortable when they see teenagers vaping or smoking, and adults smoking in children's parks. They suggested that smoking should be banned in these areas to protect children's health.

HOSPITAL

Regarding the hospital, they shared concerns about the pressure that staff are under and the need for more healthcare for children. They suggested that a children's hospital would be helpful in relieving some of the pressure on the main hospital. They also thought that the hospital could be made more welcoming and child-friendly to help alleviate some of the stress and anxiety that children may feel when they are there.



BULLYING

The students discussed the serious problem of bullying in schools, including different types such as cyberbullying, mental and physical bullying. They suggested implementing a system to stop bullying in every school in Jersey and beyond to end the daily struggles some people go through. The students also identified bullying and cyberbullying as reasons why year 6 students may be struggling. They mentioned peer pressure as a problem in some schools, with some kids not being as confident as others and being taken advantage of. The students suggested that teachers should teach bullies in a more supportive way, as they may have underlying issues causing them to bully.



HOUSING

The students expressed concern about the rising cost of housing and cost of living in Jersey, which is making it difficult for people to afford to live in Jersey, even if they want to. They feel that there are too many built-up areas with apartments and commercial buildings and not enough schools, fields, sports centres, and entertainment. They suggest that the government could build more houses instead of flats or use derelict houses in town. The students also mentioned that the high cost of housing is affecting people's ability to follow their careers, as they may need to leave the island to find affordable housing.

Thinking about the year 6's concerns, there are a number of things that the island can do to improve the quality of life for these young people.

PLAY

- The Government should prioritise building affordable entertainment venues around the island, including in the east of the island
- The condition of existing facilities should be improved, and regular maintenance should be carried out to ensure they are clean and safe
- The cinema and Aqua splash should not be closed down until replacement facilities are built
- Young people should be involved in the new 'play' strategy
- Young people are invited to contribute to the Youth Parliament 'Right to Play' campaign

FOOD

- Schools should provide more variety in school meals, perhaps the students could help design the meals
- Measures should be taken to discourage students from bringing unhealthy food into schools
- Parents may need to be educated on this

3

COST OF LIVING

- GST removed on essential school items
- Second hand school supplies sale before the start of a new term

4

TRANSPORT

- The Government should invest in building more walking and bike paths around the island and ensure that pavements are wide enough for pedestrians
- Better education for car users to ensure that young people feel safe if on a bike
- A review of bus routes to ensure that there are adequate buses to young people hot spots

5

ONLINE SAFETY

- Schools should review their computer protection systems to ensure that they are not too restrictive, and that students are able to access information relevant to their studies.
- Students should be provided with guidance on online safety, including how to protect their personal information and how to recognize and avoid online threats.



ENVIRONMENT

- The Government and parishes should prioritise creating more green areas in public spaces and planting more trees and plants.
- Nature areas should be created in playgrounds to encourage children to learn about and appreciate nature.
- Education about climate change should be incorporated into the school curriculum.
- Laws against littering should be more strictly enforced.



EDUCATION

- Students should be made more aware of future opportunities available to them as some suggested a university should be built but there already is degree courses on offer
- Schools should have multi-lingual staff and different languages celebrated
- School playing fields should open after school hours to encourage free play



MOVING TO SECONDARY SCHOOL

- Youth clubs should run year 6 and 7 mixed evenings to enable young people to make friends with students in the year above
- School to have past students in to reassure year 6's
- Youth workers to attend transition days in all schools to provide support
- Schools to provide maps to all students before their first day to allow themselves to familiarise themselves with the buildings



TESTS AND HOMEWORK

- Teachers and schools should be better supported to help them manage the pressure on students during exams and tests. This could include additional resources, training, or support staff.
- The Government should promote mental health awareness in schools and provide additional resources for students who need help managing stress and anxiety
- The Government should also consider investing in more extra-curricular activities for students, such as sports clubs or arts programs, which can help to reduce stress and improve mental health, along with homework clubs for those struggling to do it at home.

SMOKING

- Smoking to be banned in public play areas, instill designated smoking areas away from playgrounds
- Increase public awareness campaigns to educate people about the harmful effects of second hand smoke

HOSPITAL

 Improve the aesthetics of the hospital environment to create a more welcoming and less intimidating atmosphere, especially for children. This could include murals, artwork, and other forms of decor created by young people.

BULLYING

- Develop and implement a comprehensive anti-bullying policy for CYPES that covers all types of bullying, including physical, verbal, and cyberbullying. The policy should be regularly reviewed and updated, and should include guidelines on how to identify and report bullying, consequences for bullies, and support for victims
- Work with parents and the community to raise awareness about bullying with regards to both the victim and the bully
- Encourage open communication: Encouraging students to talk openly about bullying can help identify problem areas and provide support for victims. The government can work with schools to create a safe space where students can talk openly about their experiences.
- Provide support and additional training for teachers and staff on how to identify and prevent bullying, and how to intervene.

HOUSING

- Increase the availability of affordable housing: The government could work towards increasing the supply of affordable housing, such as through subsidising new housing developments or incentivising developers to build more affordable homes.
- Focus on building more houses, not just flats: As suggested by the group, the government could look at building more houses rather than just apartments, which would provide more options for families and help to reduce the density of the built-up areas.
- Utilise existing derelict houses
- Address the gap between house prices and wages

HIGHLIGHTS

Following on from the group discussions, the young people then voted on the issues that they would like to focus on in the afternoon. The three most popular topics were the cost of living, the environment and play.

They young people got into groups to further their discussions around these three issues and created a video which can be viewed on the Jersey Youth Parliament YouTube Channel.



The group were really concerned about pollution, the amount of trees being cut down and wanted the use of pesticides to stop.



This groups campaign is about having more places and things for kids and children to play with and having happy memories.


The group identified things that they felt was needed on the island:

- Entertainment for kids 10-14




LIVE TO PLAY TODAY
